Dear Parents/Carers

The dust has just about settled after an extremely busy second half of the summer term. It has been wonderful to welcome so many of you back into school again and to feel that connection with the community rebuilding. This half term alone we have had the Well Dressing, theY6 residential took place, there were excellent production performances from Reception, years 1 and 2 and years 5 and 6 (year 5 and 6 were also involved in Violin and Viola concerts to parents, which sounded amazing, thanks as always to Margaret from Cambridgeshire Music). We have also had a STEM week, which involved year 5 and 6 coordinating scientific experiments and challenges for the younger children, as well as visiting speakers from the parent body. We all really enjoyed a lovely Sports day a few weeks ago and the celebration of work evening happened very recently. Our new staff remarked on how welcome they were made to feel and enjoyed meeting those of you who were able to make it. There were also many special year 6 events in the heat of the last week of term, including their school barbecue, talent show assembly and service at the church. All of this culminated in a quite emotional final assembly on Wednesday as we reflected on some of the different departures this year.

In addition to all of the above there have been some wonderful HSA events in recent weeks too and we are very grateful for all the work that they put into the summer fair (I've just about dried off now), inflatable fun, father's day present room and the school disco.









During the previous half term we had our art week and although most of these projects were completed during the week, some continued into this half term. One involved every child in the school decorating their own individual crosses. These have now been combined into a school Collaborative Cross which is proudly displayed in the school hall as a symbol of how our school is very much about what we all bring to it.

Another project which was begun in the art week and which has developed slightly this half term is the butterfly art outside my office. The piece will very likely be called Water of Life; one of our most sung hymns and is a reminder of how Holywell School prepares our children for the next part of their journey. As mentioned in the previous newsletter, all the year six children were involved in decorating their own butterfly. Happily, many of the children leaving us this summer have younger siblings in the school and we look forward to continuing to work with you. We would like to say farewell to some families though, some of whom have very long associations with the school. ## **Governance**

## **Mr Harland's Projects**

I've already mentioned Mr Harland's work on the Collaborative Cross in this newsletter and he is also mentioned under item 4 of the Governor's points, or the water feature he has created for us in theY6/Y3 courtyard is. We are very fortunate indeed to have such a hardworking and resourceful site manager as part of the team. No sooner had he finished the water feature in the court yard, (which again reflects Flowing, Strengthening, Deepening) than he began working on repurposing the wooden structure in the Y1 playground, some of you may have noticed it had disappeared but it is currently being rebuilt in an entirely different way. ### School Development Plan

This was also mentioned under the governor's points, this year we plan on working on further developing our music provision, particularly in the lower years, as well as increasing fieldwork and investigation in key subjects. We will be looking to enhance our communication systems and also continuing to ensure that we are able to meet the mental and emotional health needs of all our pupils and staff. There will be emphasis on helping children to catch up on lost learning due to the pandemic and we will be looking at how we can expand out after school care provision.

Some imminent changes involve our playtime and PE provision. We have a new playground project called 'Scrapstore Playpods' which will launch in the second half of the Autumn term, a new shed which will support this provision should appear on the playground in the next week or two (information on the project itself will be shared next term). We are very excited that Mrs Tyers will now be with us full time and she will help to ensure that there are more active options on the playground too, ably assisted by our new Y6 play leaders who were trained towards the end of this term. Mrs Tyers appointment also means there will be a wider variety of school sports clubs on offer in the very near future (details of our newest club, which began a few weeks ago, is at the very end of this newsletter) and that we will have a more structured and organised approach to competing in competitions with other schools.
